Conference Overview

We are back in 2023! This accredited nursing conference is designed to address practical issues and clinical challenges that oncology nurses face each day. During this two-day conference, attendees will benefit from an intimate learning environment in which prominent faculty will present the latest in oncology care and provide practical strategies and tools to improve nursing practice and patient outcomes. If your schedule does not allow you to attend this program in-person, a virtual livestream offering is available at a discounted price.

CEU Accreditation & Credit Designation/ILNA Points

This conference has been approved by the California Board of Registered Nursing, with provider number 17163, for a total of **16.5 Contact Hours (8.0 for Friday and 8.5 for Saturday)**, of continuing education credit for registered nurses.

Conference Venue and Accommodations

Waterfront Hilton Beach Resort, Huntington Beach, California

The 2023 Embracing Excellence in Oncology Nursing Practice conference will be held at the Waterfront Hilton Beach Resort located in Huntington Beach. This oceanfront resort is within a 5-minute walk of the beach, the Huntington Beach Pier and Pacific City, offering many shopping and restaurant options.

The Waterfront Hilton Beach Resort is conveniently located one hour from Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) and just minutes away from John Wayne Airport, Orange County (SNA). Educational Objectives

DAY ONE

- Identify new drugs/agents that have been FDA approved for cancer treatment in 2023 and recognize how new drugs/agents are given generic names and how to gain information based on the naming system.
- Describe the unique benefits of an intergenerational and diverse workforce and identify how to cultivate expertise in the novice oncology nurse. Demonstrate how professional organizations can optimize career development at every level.
- Describe young adult sexuality in the trajectory of normal developmental milestones and recognize potential changes because of a cancer diagnosis. Review interventions to manage sexual problems because of their cancer diagnosis and therapy and identify challenges and facilitators to address this topic with your patients.
- Describe the physiology of the disease process, symptoms, diagnosis and treatments comparing and contrasting leukemia and lymphoma. Discuss new treatments currently available and the future direction of care.
- Describe three cultural myths that are barriers to good care for people with serious illness, how to overcome them and describe communication tools to help with serious illness, understanding patient goals and values and how palliative care can help people live well and long.
- Identify one workplace violence trend that applies to your clinical setting, recall two common responses to workplace violence and propose one way to improve the safety of your healthcare setting.
- Recognize common perioperative complications for patients undergoing surgery for gynecologic cancer, understand the role of minimally invasive surgery in gynecologic cancer and the nurse's role with the elements of ERAS and patient success. Develop tools to navigate complex care of patients receiving inpatient chemotherapy with or without surgery.
- Describe what factors contribute to the development of resiliency when faced with a sudden or serious change in health circumstances.

DAY TWO

- Identify communication strategies to facilitate an open and reciprocal dialogue about common sexual problems. Summarize evidenced based pharmacotherapies that treat sexual problems and describe strategies to improve physical, emotional, and sexual wellbeing of individuals and couples treated for cancer.
- List and summarize the latest advances in melanoma treatment, terminology, and technical aspects of melanoma care. Discuss patient-active behavior in working with the healthcare team to make ongoing treatment decisions.
- Identify the barriers to effective communication in the care of oncology patients. Demonstrate three core communication skills when working with oncology patients, their families, and physicians. Recognize the impact of implicit bias and the role of cultural humility in the care of patients.
- Describe the benefits of daily mindfulness and how to incorporate the same practices into oncology patient care.
- Provide an overview of the most common hereditary cancer syndromes, causative genes, and the management guidelines.
- Discuss the pathophysiology of the different types of infusion related HSR to chemotherapy and immunotherapy agents and review strategies for prevention and treatment. Develop an evidence-based treatment plan for the management of infusion-related HSR.
- Describe the potential of better collegial relationships and how it impacts the emotional, social and physical wellbeing of an oncology nursing staff which leads to improved patient care and patient outcomes.
- Identify current lung cancer screening recommendations and additional patient characteristics that indicate need for screening and discuss various surgical options for the treatment of lung and esophageal cancer.

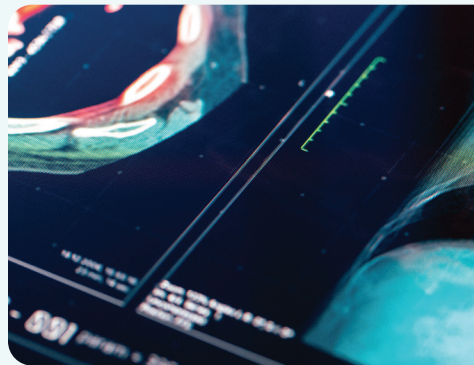
